

THE 2002 INTERIM MEETING OF THE AMA House of Delegates (held Dec. 8 11 in New Or leans, La.) opened with rousing calls to action on the Medicare physician payment crisis and med ical liability reform. AMA President Yank D. Coble, MD, urged American physicians to enter the fray and take up the fight to fully exercise their duty to their profession, their colleagues and to their patients.

And CMS will soon do just that. The Society is forging ahead with plans to hold a rally at Chica go s Daley Center this spring. We will keep you posted on the date, and on how you can partici pate. Don t miss out on this opportunity to show your support for legislative reform!

### We've reorganized to better serve you

CMS NOW HAS A NEW ORGANIZATIONAL structure. As reported in the September 02 issue of CMSnews, your Society is now composed of a 501(c)(6) parent organization temporarily called the Chicago Medical Society Association, and a 501 (c)(3) private foundation, the Chicago Medical Society.

#### Why is this important to you?

The creation of this new 501(c)(6) tax status paves the way for greater physician advocacy. The 501(c)(6) will allow CMS to build a forum for grassroots political activity, encouraging individ ual participation and bringing a united front to civic leaders and legislators. The revamped or ganization gives CMS more flexibility, allowing it to offer the services of a professional society and an educational/scientific foundation.

The Chicago Medical Society Council adopted a resolution to support the proposed ban on smoking in Chicago restaurants. Richard A. Geline, MD, CMS president, has attended a press conference, written testimony to the City Council Health Committee, and sent letters to all area news papers to support strengthening the Clean Indoor Air Act.

The Mayor initially indicated he would consider such an ordinance, but is reported ly having second thoughts.

The restaurant owners have expressed their opinions. Now it s our turn to be heard.

### Delegates rally against Medicare cuts

January presents narrow window of opportunity

OUTRAGED THAT THE U.S. SENATE ADJOURNED for the holiday recess without fixing documented mistakes in the Medicare payment formula, AMA leaders have vowed to turn up the heat on Congress.

Speaking out at the 2002 Interim Meeting in New Orleans, Dec. 8 11, delegates announced measures to stop \$11 billion in Medicare cuts over the next three years and avoid a catastrophic ac cess meltdown. These steps include:

- Nationwide distribution of educational hand outs to Medicare patients through physician of fices.
- Appeals to patients to contact their senators through the AMA Grassroots Hotline.
- A physician fly in to Washington, D.C., Jan. 8 9, 2003, offering participants the opportunity to make congressional house calls on elected officials. (Similar state and county events were held on the local level.)
- Purchase of ads in USA Today and The New York Times and drive time radio.
- Expansion of physician grassroots activity through faxes, e mails and the toll free hotline.

If Congress does not act immediately when it convenes in January, another 4.4 percent payment cut will compound the 5.4 percent cut levied in 2002. Without intervention, the cuts are expected to total close to 18 percent by 2005.

This next round of cuts, scheduled to take effect March 1, gives Congress just a tiny window of opportunity to stop the crisis.

#### Medicare errors explained

The Health Care Financing Administration admitted to errors made in 1998 and 1999 in developing the Medicare equation. Those mistakes included under estimating the gross domestic product and the omis sion of medical care costs for one million people. In addition, the physician spending pool currently in cludes outpatient drugs, the cost of which is growing faster than actual physician services. By fixing these two errors and taking the drugs out of the target, the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid services could help avert a series of sharp Medicare payment cuts.

### 2002 Interim Meeting— Topics in the spotlight

THE 2002 INTERIM MEETING BROUGHT together physicians representing 170 medical soci eties. The 1000+ delegates considered more than 80 reports and resolutions pertaining to trends in science, ethics, government, public health and medical business. Among them:

- Government s Medicare payment mistake and its threat to seniors access to care.
- Removing the legal system as an obstacle to ac cessible health care.
- Alcohol industry s aggressive television market ing to young viewers.
- Recent scientific developments in smallpox and the smallpox vaccine.
- Patients contracting physicians for exclusive boutique services.
- Removing antibiotics from meat used for public school lunch programs.
- Electronic mail between patients and physicians
- Eliminating racial and ethnic disparities in health care.

#### TIPS FROM THE EEOC

## Americans with Disabilities Act and your practice

PHYSICIANS STATEMENTS, DIAGNOSES, AND prognoses play a major role in the Equal Employ ment Opportunity Commission s (EEOC) evaluation of disability claims.

Here are some pointers:

- The ADA makes it unlawful for an employer to make any employment decisions on the basis of ac tual disability, perceived disability, record of disability, and/or relationship with an individual with a disability.
- The ADA also makes it unlawful for employers to retaliate against any employee or applicant for opposing an employment practice that they regard as discriminatory.
- The employment practices regulated by the ADA include recruitment, application, testing, hiring, termination, medical examinations, as well as other terms and conditions of employment.
- Beyond simple non discrimination, the ADA requires employers to provide a reasonable ac commodation for the known physical or men tal limitations of an employee or applicant with a disability, where no undue hardship is in volved.

In addition to diagnosing and treating dis ability conditions and documenting work re strictions for disabled individuals, physicians can also prescribe assistive technology tools for their patients to use at work. A few examples of standard software and hardware available include:

**Duxbury Braille:** Software that translates print ed text to Braille to print out to a Braille embosser printer.

**Dragon Naturally Speaking:** Voice recognition software that allows individuals with dexterity disabilities to perform tasks such as writing memos, completing forms, and sending e mail.

**ZoomTet** A screen enlarger to minimize eye strain.

JAWS Software that reads text aloud.

**NexTak** TTY software that allows deaf and hard of hearing individuals to communicate with others via TTY or relay.

#### Federal laws enforced by the EEOC

- Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, as amended, which prohibits employment discrimination based on race, color, sex, national origin, or religion.
- The Civil Rights Act of 1991 (CRA 91), which strengthens and improves federal civil rights laws and provides for remedies in cases of intentional employment discrimination.
- The Age Discrimination in Employment Act of 1967, as amended (ADEA), which prohibits employment discrimination against persons age 40 or older.
- The Equal Pay Act of 1963 (EPA), which pro hibits disparity in compensation for similar work based on gender.
- Title I of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990 (ADA), which prohibits employment discrimination based on disability.
