Chicago's health chief connects with CMS

TERRY MASON, MD, CHICAGO'S NEW health commissioner, made a guest appearance at the CMS Council meeting Sept. 19 to underscore the need for continued collaboration between the CDPH and CMS, particularly in educating doctors how to respond to a potential avian flu pandemic. In calling preparedness planning the most challenging issue facing public health, Dr. Mason described what the city, state, and federal response would be in the event of a bird flu outbreak in Chicago. He stressed the importance of early and aggressive vaccine and quarantine. While the city had little funding for emergency programs prior to 9/11, today CDPH has a budget of \$18 million and a staff of eight devoted to disasters and emerging threats, he said. In the course of five years, planning has evolved from bioterrorism preparedness to include all types of hazards.

Retail health clinics resolution adopted

The CMS Council met on Sept. 19. Among the highlights was the passage of an emergency resolution on health clinics. The language calls for:

• All patients to be referred back to their primary care physicians.

• Follow-up care to be recommended to all patients, using similar guidelines/policies that exist for emergency care at hospitals and health-care centers.

• All patients to be given a written copy of all procedures performed, treatment and recommendations given at the clinics.

• A regulatory entity to be formed immediately to monitor the availability of physician-consultants; conflict of interest issues; policies for follow-up on results of diagnostic procedures and laboratory tests; drug

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usage; continuity of care; and appropriate collaboration and oversight by physicians.

This resolution gives official Council endorsement for the work already begun between CMS leadership and Walgreens, as well as Take Care representatives. The language is intended as a basic road map to be expanded or refined as needed.

The Council approved other resolutions: "I'M Sorry"

• Supports a full-disclosure policy and endorses "I'm Sorry" legislation (735 ILCS 5/8-1901) (from Ch. 110, par. 8-1901) for responding to medical errors and granting legal protection to physicians from their apologies being used against them in court.

• Acknowledges full-disclosure policies as a useful adjunct for helping to ease the medical liability crisis.

• Requests the CMS Executive Committee to study and report back in order to coordinate CMS policy with the ISMS position on full disclosure.

• Communicates this policy to county medical societies, the Chicago and Illinois Bar Associations, and the Illinois Hospital Association, etc., for their support in implementing risk management teams to educate doctors and hospitals on using the "I'm Sorry" approach with patients and their families.

HEALTHY EATING IN SCHOOLS

• Supports rules providing for healthy eating in both public and private schools, modeled after legislation in Maine.

• Endorses the introduction of a similar resolution at the Illinois State Medical Society so that legislation can be enacted statewide for the benefit of all Illinois' children.

NEWS FOR CHICAGO PHYSICIANS

CLIMATE CHANGE

• 1) Urges all physicians to learn more about the changes due to global warming; 2) urges both public and private sectors in the U.S. to advance policies that reduce reliance on fossil fuels and promote clean and safe alternative energy technologies; 3) urges the U.S. President to take steps to curb greenhouse emissions and to work with other nations to address the dangers of global climate change through binding reduction targets for emissions; and 4) organizes a physician task force to investigate global warming issues and propose programs and policies for action. These recommendations were adopted at the ISMS and AMA.

Physician Suicide

• Calls for the publication of educational articles on physician suicide in *Chicago Medicine*.

Board retreat highlights

• Trustees and guests discussed efforts to recruit and retain students and residents. It was agreed that CMS student and resident sections should hold regional meetings for students and offer mentorship opportunities. Aman Ali, MD, was named interim chair of the Residents Section. Discussion revolved around getting professors and program directors to join CMS because students will follow their leaders' example. The retreat was held in July.

• A two-day MCC will be held in March with a different focus and new topics.

Bylaws changes submitted for review

• The Bylaws Committee recommended changes to the Bylaws and Policy Manual. Councilors will vote on them in November.

The next Council meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, Nov. 7.

CMS study to examine medication non-compliance among elderly

THE CHICAGO MEDICAL SOCIETY IS sponsoring a study that will look at a possi-

ble relationship between Medicare Part D coverage and medication non-compliance among senior citizens. The study is being funded through a grant from the Washington Square Foundation.

We ask for the help of physicians

and other health professionals in locating:

- Seniors no longer taking their medications.
- Seniors no longer taking their medications *regularly*.
- Seniors suffering symptoms that indicate possible medication non-compliance.

Subjects will be interviewed in-depth to learn the etiology of their non-compliance and how long they have not been taking their medications as directed. Study results may indicate needed areas of improvement in the Medicare Part D program to better serve the population.

While other recent studies have published national survey results on Part D, none of them have been specific to Cook County or to Illinois. No study has interviewed seniors. We believe that these corrections in study design will give Cook County's physicians and their patients a better understanding of ways to work with the new Medicare program.



Conference to address health care reform, clinical ethics
